- Author: Luke the physician
- ▶ Place written: Likely written from Rome
- When: 63 A.D. based on the fact that Acts ends abruptly with Paul under house arrest awaiting trial in Rome.
- Written to: Your Excellency Theophilus, who is thought to be a high ranking government official and believer. The name means "God lover".

Overview of the Book of Acts Purpose

- To record the establishment and early growth of the church
- Give examples of conversions to the gospel of Christ
- Reveal the ministry of the Holy Spirit in the apostles and the early church

Acts

- ▶ Theme
 - The book begins in Jerusalem and ends at Rome. It describes the establishment and growth of the church throughout the Mediterranean world through the work of the apostles and other Christians under the direction of the Holy Spirit.

► Key verse: Acts 1:8

"But you shall receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you shall be witnesses to me in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the end of the earth."

- ▶ What is the duty of a witness?
 - ▶ To state that which is true.
- What does it mean to be a witness of Christ?
 - Confess by words or by way of life that one is a child of God and the Lord Jesus is his personal Savior
 - Confess that one is a member of God's kingdom here on earth.
 - Confess that there is only one saving faith and that God has only one kingdom



 - Conversion of the Samaritans
 - ► Conversion of the Ethiopian eunuch
 - ▶ The conversion of Saul (9:1-31)
 - Saul blinded on the road to Damascus; hears the voice of Jesus
 - Conversion and baptism of Saul by Ananias
 - Saul becomes Paul and begins the work of the Spirt

- ▶ Miracles performed through Peter (9:32-43)
 - ▶ Healing of Aeneas
 - Raising of Dorcas from the dead
- ► The conversion of Cornelius (10:1-11:19)
 - ▶ As recorded by Luke
 - ► As told by Peter

- ► The ministry of Barnabas, Saul and Peter (11:19-12:25)
 - Barnabas and Paul at Antioch
 - Barnabas and Paul in Judea
 - Persecution by Herod; James is beheaded, Peter is arrested
 - Peter freed from prison by an angel; Herod dies
